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Anti-seizure medicines work best given consistently, at the same times each day. The most important rule is never to stop suddenly, even if your pet seems well or you dislike a side effect: the answer to a problem is a phone call to your vet, never a sudden stop. Tick each dose as you give it so a missed one is obvious at a glance.

Worth mentioning to your vet

- Wobbliness that does not settle
- A big rise in thirst, appetite or toileting
- Sedation that is not wearing off
- Any vomiting, or going off food
- Seizures breaking through

If you ever miss a dose, do not double up: follow the catch-up plan your vet gave you, or ring them. Keep a few days buffer of medication so you never run out.
