NEVER STOP SUDDENLY

Heart medicines, water tablets especially, hold a careful balance. Stopping one suddenly can tip a stable pet into trouble. If a dose is vomited, refused, or you run low, ring your vet rather than guessing or doubling up.

A FEW HABITS THAT HELP

- A pill organiser or a tick-box on this chart so you can see a dose was given
- Order a repeat before you run out, water tablets are not ones to miss
- Keep fresh water always available (some of these increase thirst and weeing)
- Note any vomited or refused dose to mention at the next call
