WAYS TO MAKE IT MANAGEABLE

- Insurance matters for a long-term condition. Lifetime cover behaves differently to annual cover, and anything diagnosed before a policy starts is usually excluded.
- Many practices offer payment plans or monthly health plans. It is fine to ask.
- Charitable help exists for those who qualify, usually based on means-tested benefits and where you live, for example through PDSA or Blue Cross.
- Buying the diet in bulk can work out cheaper.
- Ask whether a written prescription, for which there is often a small fee, would let you buy medicines from a registered online pharmacy.
